Documentary film: The Devil We Know. The Chemistry of a Cover-Up

Tuesday, March 19, 7 p.m., Salem's Grand Theatre, 191 High Street NE

The Devil We Know is a story of how one synthetic chemical, used to make Teflon products, contaminated a West Virginia community. But new research hints at a much broader problem: nearly all Americans are affected by exposure to non-stick chemicals in food, drinking water, and consumer products. With very little oversight on the chemical industry in this country, we invite you to learn more about the problem and how you can protect yourself and your family. The documentary will be followed by guest speakers and an audience discussion.

Meet Our New Members

Claudia Carmichael—I am new to Salem, but not new to Oregon as I moved to Eugene thirty years ago. I found out about AAUW from my sister-in-law in San Marcos, CA, who was the president of her branch. I liked the idea of joining with other women to make the path a little bit easier for younger women.

I was raised in New Orleans, and learned at an early age that my mother didn't have a lot of choices when it came to whether she would stay with my stepfather or not. She would stay—she hadn't worked in many, many years and couldn't drive. There was no other choice. I decided then I would go to college and I would have a driver's license. I earned my Bachelor of Arts in Social Studies, Secondary Education, from the University of New Orleans. And



like many of us, was the first in the family to graduate from college. I wanted to teach students who needed a little more help, and taught GED, ESL, social studies and writing classes at vocational high schools and community colleges in Washington and Oregon.

My first husband passed away while I was pregnant with our second child, but I made it through as a single mother and eight years later met my current husband who was also a teacher and coach. We both worked at high schools in Eugene, and after many years we retired to Arizona in search of sun. I joined AAUW in Prescott and was excited to find a program called Sister-to-Sister that helped mentor female first-generation community college students. Later as sun and politics began to wear on us, we became snowbirds, and I co-joined the Green Valley branch (south of Tucson) along with the Salem Branch. Last year we moved back to Salem full time. I have been pleased to find at each branch of AAUW a welcoming group of intelligent women who care about making the world a better place. Together we can make a difference!

Deb Patterson—Deborah Patterson is ordained clergy in the Congregational Church, currently serving a 128-year old rural congregation near Canby. Prior to her return to active ministry, she served twenty years as a healthcare advocate, including a decade as the director of an international health organization, the International Parish Nurse Resource Center, now called The Westberg Institute. Earlier, she was founding vice president of a children's health foundation (Deaconess Foundation) and served on the senior management team of a multi-hospital system in St. Louis.
