Public Forum on Campaign Finance Reform on September 17



Rep. Dan Rayfield

Representative Dan Rayfield and a panel of policy experts and campaign finance reform legislative leaders will present a forum on *Campaign Finance Reform* on Tuesday, September 17, from 7 - 8:30 p.m., at the Oregon Capitol in Room 350, 900 Court St. NE.

Dan Rayfield is currently serving in the Oregon House of Representatives, representing House District 16, comprising Corvallis and Philomath, an office he has held since 2014. Rep. Rayfield and the other panelists are on a statewide tour (eight cities will be visited) to present a history of Oregon campaign finance reform, describe the 2019 Legislature's accomplishments, and spur a community discussion about the future of campaign finance reform.

Marion and Polk County League of Women Voters and the Salem Branch of AAUW are cosponsors of this informational event. Campaign Finance Reform has been a priority for the League as well as AAUW members. Kappy Eaton,

who served many decades advocating for both organizations, made heroic efforts in Oregon's Legislature to achieve Campaign Finance Reform.

I was born in Los Angeles and have lived on both coasts, Montana, Japan, and Hawaii. I came to Eugene 10 years ago following divorce. I looked at a map and found a progressive city with lots of water, that wasn't in the mountains, and in which the ex-husband had no desire to live.

I was a Navy wife from Vietnam to Gulf War the First; our postings included Panama and Granada. I sometimes had as many as three jobs, sequentially, at each change of station, as I tried to find the right fit. Once I had to take a job as a technical writer and morph it into a programming job, as I finished the user manual. That small company was very determined that no "girls" were going to get to work any of the engineering jobs. But they wanted the text processor that I wrote!

My college career was interrupted just a little by marriage, but I got my Bachelor of Science in Computer Science degree in 1974. Ours was the first graduating class in the new discipline at Washington State University, *go Cougs*. I also put in time at the University of Washington, the University of Maryland (overseas), Napa Community College, Montana State University, and I taught computer programming for Central Texas College on Misawa Air Base in northern Japan.

I only had 20 years in my career as a Software Developer, Systems Analyst, and Site Manager, as I contracted Lyme Disease in 1990. I got rid of it in 2000, but was never able to regain enough of my mental abilities, particularly speed and working memory, to resume a full-fledged career. Nowadays, I don't do any programming; I just use programs that other people have written.

From 1991- 2009 I had a horse ranch in Bozeman, Montana. I bred, raised, and trained large ponies for riding and driving as well as horses for riding. I still love horses, but that itch has been scratched, and I never need to own another one; they tend to self-destruct, given the least chance. I particularly don't need to deal with another stallion. They are very opinionated. The mares insist on telling them how wonderful they are.

My hobbies are learning Spanish and traveling to Spanish-speaking countries and playing banjo and singing along in my one-octave range. I love walking with my dog and playing in my garden, joints permitting.

I'm looking forward to working with you and am hopeful that I'll get to know you and your Branch in the coming year. **Note:** There will not be a district meeting this fall.

AAUW Oral History Project 2019

Our AAUW Oral History Project goal was to honor our life members who have contributed to Salem Branch's longevity and success.

We were fortunate to make the connection with CCTV (Capitol Community Television). Gloria Holland and I met with Wendy Brokaw, Outreach Specialist, at CCTV and discussed our plan. We made a timeline to proceed.

At this point in our project we had the means to videotape our interviewees. Now we needed a place to do the interviews, and that was handled by Joanne Stern. She made the reservations at Capitol Manor for the days and times needed.

We identified the members in our branch who are life members and have contributed to the Salem Branch/State AAUW. In doing so we wanted to capture their stories and voices.

We selected Jo Bateman, Marian Churchill, Rae Everitt, Gloria Martin, Evelyn Lorence Smith, Carol Neiger, Heraldine Schwartz, Meredie Sheehy, and Joanne Stern.

We sent emails/letters to them with the dates, times and place for the interviews along with a list of questions that would be asked during the interview process.

Our 4-day schedule set, we started on June 27th and completed the interviews on August 23rd. Each interview took about 45 minutes (including setup). To make each interviewee comfortable, Gloria explained that her interview would simply be a conversation.

This project was made possible in large part to the skills of Wendy Brokaw, who made the women's stories come alive. Now she is busy adding photos and editing the interviews.

The AAUW Salem Branch Oral History Project will be viewed by all on CCTV. We'll let you know when the program is ready for viewing. Copies of the program will be sent to Oregon AAUW, National AAUW, and placed in our local archives.
