Earth Day holds a special place in my heart. When I was in the 5th grade, I organized a group of my classmates to go out and pick up litter every week. We called ourselves "The Litter Spitters". It was similar to the programs we have now where groups adopt roads or highways and periodically go out and pick up trash. But what was it back in 1970 that motivated people to get involved in cleaning up our planet? A little history......

Following the onset of the Industrial Revolution in the 1850's, our country experienced exponential growth of factories, chemical manufacturing and technology. The automobile was invented and we developed a thirst for fossil fuel to power our machines, move our vehicles and heat our homes.
